However, it was only in 2017 that Pope Francis, upon meeting the Rwandan President Paul Kagame, officially asked for forgiveness for the Catholic Church's role in the 1994 genocide, stating that, in Rwanda, the "sins and failings of the Church and its members had ultimately disfigured the face of Catholicism".

The 1994 genocide was by no means a religious conflict. Rwanda is a homogeneous culture; all Rwandans share the common language of Kinyarwanda, and 90 percent of Rwandans are Christian. To quote Catherine Newbury, the genocide was a political phenomenon with class conflict overtones that used ethnicity as the language through which fears and ambitions were expressed.

One of the worst massacres of the Rwandan Genocide took place on April 15 to 16, 1994 at the Nyarubuye Roman Catholic Church, located about 60 miles east of Kigali. When the Roman Catholic missionaries came to Rwanda in the late 1880s, they contributed to the "Hamitic" theory of race origins, which taught that the Tutsi were a superior race. The Church has been considered to have played a significant role in fomenting racial divisions between Hutu and Tutsi, in part because they found more willing converts among the majority Hutu.
